- Reporting on and protecting the loons




While up from earlier years, 2017 memberships and revenue were down slightly from 2016. Members went from 162 in 2016 to at 154 in 2017 (-5%) and member properties went from 145 in 2016 to 133 in 2017 (-8%). We ended 2017 with only about 52% of Watchic Lake properties supporting WLA volunteers in maintaining the lake.

### Water Quality 2017 – Generally Good, But at Risk

We have completed our 2017 water quality report for Watchic Lake and its tributaries. In summary, the report states that while water quality is good today, nutrients entering the lake continue to pose long term risks to water quality, and thus quality of life. The message in the report is clear — as property owners and interested stakeholders, we must work to address increasing runoff into the lake to improve oxygen levels, avoid algal blooms and excessive plant growth, and retain a healthy habitat for fish, loons, and other wildlife. Algal Blooms – Risks are Real for Watchic Lake



This recent satellite of North and East Ponds in central Maine shows how algal blooms impact water quality. The two lakes are similar in most respects but East Pond (right side) blooms yearly, threatening recreation and property values. This problem is believed to be due to increased phosphorus from storm water runoff into East Pond. Years of work by the lake association to stop storm water pollution have failed to correct the problem. Now, local conservation efforts have raised the \$1,000,000 needed to treat the lake with aluminum phosphate in order to clear the water.

Watchic Lake is like East Pond; its spring fed, shallow,

and without significant flow to wash phosphorus out. Algal blooms are a real risk to Watchic Lake and are a situation none of us want to face. Stopping storm water pollution before it gets into the lake is the best way to preserve water quality, avoid algal blooms, and protect the way of life we all enjoy on Watchic Lake.



# Need Advice on Making Your Property More Lake Friendly? Check out LakeSmart

The LakeSmart program is a great way for property owners to learn how best to manage their properties to avoid storm water runoff. The program offers free opportunities for homeowners to learn how to manage their home and yard to protect the water quality of their lake. The primary focus of LakeSmart is to keep our lake water clean by stabilizing eroding areas, reducing the use of chemicals, diverting rainwater into vegetated areas, and maintaining or planting trees, shrubs, and ground cover along the shoreline.
