Watchic Lake Invasive Infestation Risk


Recently Maine DEP analyzed most lakes in Maine for current invasive infestations and the risk of infestation. While Watchic Lake is currently invasive-free, we are considered by Maine DEP to be high risk. This is due mostly to our proximity to other infested lakes and the large surrounding population.

In an effort to reduce the risk of invasives, on August 5th a group of WLA volunteers completed the annual Invasive Plant Paddle, and did not find any invasive plants. Should you see a suspicious plant, let us know at Reporting Suspicious Plants.

PLEASE ensure all boats, kayaks/canoes, tubes/boards, fishing gear, life jackets, etc. entering the lake from your property are free of all plant life!

Draining hulls, bailers, live wells, etc is now the law in Maine! <u>Public Law 203 Chapter 190</u> is effective June 16, 2023.

Loon Update From Kim and Steve Lajoie

The last weekend in July was a rough one for the loons on Watchic Lake. First, on Saturday, July 29 we were notified that one of the Blueberry Island chicks had beached itself (which is never a good sign). We collected the chick and brought him to a certified wildlife rehabilitator in Bridgeton. Unfortunately the chick died the next day. Given its condition, it likely died of a boat strike.

Then, an adult loon (not of the parenting pairs) began acting strangely and beaching itself twice. The body of this loon was found near the Paine Brook inlet, and taken to the Biodiversity Research Institute, who believe it likely died of lead poisoning. Folks had seen an eagle pecking at the dead loon earlier in the day and speculated that it had killed the loon but this is almost certainly not the case and that the eagle was scavenging the already dead bird.

To sum up, for the first time in many years, we currently have three loon pairs with one chick each on the lake. The chicks are getting bigger quickly but still have limited ability to dive. It is critically important that all boaters keep a sharp lookout for loons and avoid them and that we all stop using lead fishing gear.

Annual Loon Count

The **annual Audubon Loon count** was also held Saturday, July 15. We had a successful loon count early in the morning. Three new volunteers joined alongside eight seasoned counters. There were quite a few loon sightings. We recorded three loon pairs, four babies and one lone adult loon.

Shortly after the loon count, Elaine Bradbury spotted a parent loon with two chicks near Watchic Rd 19 (off Route 113). Parents and chicks all seemed well.
